2	Washington Community Forestry Council Meeting
3 4	May 13, 2015 Yakima Area Arboretum, 1401 Arboretum Dr., Yakima, WA 98901

10	Meeting Convened: 9:00 a.m.
11 12	Welcome: Chair Sheila Gray called the meeting to order and welcomed council members and guests. Council members introduced themselves around the table.
13 14 15 16	Jheri Ketcham welcomed the council to the arboretum. She told us the arboretum was established in 1967 by the Yakima Garden Club. The site consists of 32 acres of cultivated ground, and 14 acres of natural area. There are approximately 1000 labeled trees. The education program is driven by the arboretum's master plan.
17 18 19	Minutes Approved: Motion to approve minutes from the February 11, meeting: Joe Scorcio; second: David Miller. Ketcham noted a misspelling of her name. With that correction, the motion passed unanimously.
20	Agenda Approved: No additions or corrections were made to the agenda.
21	DNR Urban & Community Forestry Program Report: Lampman told the council that the Urban Forestry
22	Program is housed in the Resource Protection Division of the agency; Washington Department of
23	Natural Resources. Recently the name "Resource Protection Division" was changed to "Wildfire
24	Division." The new name will be phased in over time. Lampman also reported on recent program
25	activities: DNR grant agreements = 10 inventories this year, 6 CFA grants, 4 tree planting grants.
26	Community Forestry Consultants Inc. was selected as the contractor for tree inventory data collection
27	this year. Kathy commented on data analytics and suggested having a conversation about data analysis
28	protocols. Paula and Linden discussed creating a fillable form for tree planting maintenance plans.
29	Tree planting and community forestry assistance grant agreements have been sent to communities
30	Memorandum of Understanding agreements are being sent to those communities participating in the
31	inventory grant program. The urban wood use program is in full swing. The carpentry shop is crafting
32	products from the dried wood. Linden has asked the AG's office for guidance on the donation,
33	acceptance, and distribution of wood and wood products. Linden also attended a Sustainability in

- 1 Prisons project meeting to see if other opportunities may exist for training inmates in arboriculture or
- 2 other related skills.

- 3 The Master Gardener Online Training Module project continues to be fleshed out with an agreement
- 4 anticipated in the near future. Lampman recently attended a working group meeting in Nebraska at the
- 5 invitation of the Arbor Day Foundation. The group discussed revisions to the current Growth Award
- 6 program. Ideas centered on enhanced recognition for communities with programs that consistently
- 7 engage in projects and design management systems that develop program sustainability. The program
- 8 is considering sending aggregated inventory data from the last three years to a consultant for analysis.
- 9 Kathy Wolf provided suggestions to guide the analysis and offered that this type of project would be
- appropriate for a master's student.
- 11 Lampman asked that the council consider an assignment, due at the next meeting. She would like the
- 12 council to consider what issues are most important to the organizations and groups that they represent,
- 13 citing that WCFC meetings can be a back and forth transfer of information. The Council discussed how
- 14 AWC in particular might interface with the UCF program in a reciprocal type of relationship. Council
- 15 members discussed the assignment. Wolf suggested a specific framework captured below :
 - How do you intersect with the group/organization you represent on the council?
 - O What are the hot button issues in the organization?
 - How does your organization's mission statement intersect with urban forestry?
 - What form of communication conduits are found within the organization?
 - What is the 'sticky communication' in your organization? That is, what messages resonate with the membership?
 - All members will report at the September meeting, regardless of attendance. (Written reports are acceptable if a council member is unable to attend the September meeting.)

Ben Thompson reported that his proposal to speak at the Association of Washington Cities annual conference has been accepted. The date is Wednesday, June 24th in Wenatchee. The original proposal pitched using natural resource management to build community resiliency in the face of climate change, however Ben worked with AWC to revise the proposal. The presentation will be 30 minutes about how cities can weave natural resource management into their comprehensive plans to build successful communities. The program intends to distribute relevant information about U&CF program services and Tree City USA at a table in the conference exhibit hall on the 24th.

Thompson recognized and thanked the council for their help during Arbor Day this year: Sheila Gray, Joe Scorcio, Juli Hartwig, Cindy Deffe, Terry Flatley, Garth Davis, Jheri Ketcham, Daniel Layton, Brian Cramer, and Kathy Sheehan.

Guest Speaker: David Haws from Yakima Public Services, talked about stormwater infrastructure in the Yakima Area including stormwater basics, stormwater project permitting and low Impact development (LID) regulations. Yakima County has created its own LID manual; a comprehensive guidance document that addresses uniquely local conditions. The manual is available on the Yakima County Stormwater web site. Council members asked some clarifying questions. Gray thanked Mr. Haws for providing information for the council.

- 42 Presentation: Stormwater, Green Infrastructure and Health in King County. Kathy Wolf gave a
- 43 presentation about emerging discussions around stormwater infrastructure in King County and other

- 1 urban areas; green infrastructure has multiple benefits to the urban ecosystem. Moving toward a new
- 2 definition of "metro nature" to classify urban vegetation and ecosystems in context of their benefits.
- 3 The idea of introducing social as well as environmental benefits into green installations built for
- 4 stormwater mitigation is gaining traction. Health and UCF connection is related to general human
- 5 wellness. Green infrastructure can be viewed as having many layers of benefits, both from a stormwater
- 6 and an urban forestry perspective. An example is a trail system running through a stormwater capture
- 7 site designed as a wetland. With easy access to and through the green space, residents have the
- 8 opportunity to experience nature nearby. Limited space in cities may lead to 'multi-tasking' nature.
- 9 "Nearby nature" has restorative effects on urban residents and 'Restorative nature' within (rather than
- beyond) city limits provides benefits to a greater number of urban dwellers. Wolf anticipates publishing
- an article about the multiple benefits of green infrastructure for the Stormwater, a trade journal for civil
- 12 engineers. Wolf encourages council members to visit and promote the Green Cities: Good health
- 13 website, a clearinghouse of over 3000 peer reviewed articles about health effects of urban vegetation.

Roundtable Reports:

- 15 Jheri Ketchum (representing non-profit groups): Yakima Area Arboretum (YAA) recently hosted an
- estimated 2000 people at the annual Arbor Fest. 700 trees were distributed to attendees. YAA is leading
- 17 the effort to create an urban forestry advocacy group in Yakima. Ketchum attended the Kennewick
- 18 Arbor Day event and presented their Tree City USA award.
- 19 Sheila Gray (representing Washington State Association of Counties) Attended Arbor Day events in
- 20 Centralia, Yelm and Tumwater. The Envirothon, emphasizing urban forestry this year, is coming up in a
- 21 few weeks. It will be held in Yacolt.
- 22 Kirsten Lints (representing Washington State Nursery and Landscape Association WSNLA) In
- 23 partnership with the Arbor Day Foundation's Community Tree Recovery Program and the Okanogan
- 24 County Conservation District WSNLA distributed 8000 trees and shrubs this spring in Pateros and Twisp
- to property owners that lost homes, trees and landscaping during the Carlton Complex fire of 2014.
- 26 Governor Inslee contacted WSNLA for assistance in distributing drought information to Washington
- 27 residents. Lints is working closely with the City of Duvall toward Tree City USA designation.
- 28 Joe Scorcio (representing Private or Public Land Developers). The City of SeaTac recently hosted a display
- 29 by the historical society; the Trees of Waskowicz. The display recognizes a program where middle school
- 30 students (now adults) planted trees in SeaTac and the impact those trees had on the city and on the
- 31 individuals who planted them. SeaTac recently presented a special award to retiring city forester, Roger
- 32 Chouinard for his work and commitment to urban forestry in SeaTac. Mr. Chouinard championed the
- 33 Tree City USA designation for the city; Scorcio attended Arbor Day in Puyallup and SeaTac, where Terry
- 34 Flatley presented the award to the city; Scorcio recently negotiated a fee in lieu of replanting trees at a
- 35 redeveloped Park and Fly lot in the city.
- David Miller: Ellensburg celebrated Arbor Day by partnering with Eastern Washington University (EWU)
- 37 students to plant trees. The city will maintain and water the trees. The EWU is working on a Tree
- 38 Campus designation.

- 1 Presentation: Guest Speaker, Elizabeth Housley and Kathy Wolf. Housley and Wolf presented a report
- 2 on research looking at who conservation work affects personal effectiveness and stress recovery in
- 3 participants in conservation jobs; Washington Conservation Corps (WCC) members and Veterans within
- 4 the WCC. Research focused on social interactions, individual traits and characteristics related to stress
- 5 recovery.
- 6 Pre and post surveys were given to 275 crew members, with questions related to job skills and
- 7 employment enhancement, and the physical benefits of conservation work.
- 8 Survey results showed that members were in good physical and emotional health at the onset of the
- 9 job. Through the experience they developed greater confidence, experienced personal growth, enjoyed
- 10 learning, and the crew teamwork. Crew members said that good communication enhanced their
- 11 positive experiences, while body pain and weather conditions were mentioned as challenges.
- Overall, results of the survey show this to be a healthy group of individuals from the beginning, crew
- 13 members perceived their stress as lowered, sore muscles did not interfere with their social life or
- 14 perceived overall well-being, and returning employees appear healthier than their new peers.
- 15 Council comments: Paula Dinius a program at Washington State University titled Operation Military Kids.
- 16 It is a program for teenage youth from military families, identified as high risk. The program is through 4-
- 17 H.
- 18 Break and tour of the arboretum: Council members were invited on a guided walk through the
- 19 arboretum with a visiting leadership group from Yakima.
- 20
- 21 Council Work Plan 2015: At the last meeting, council voted to focus on stormwater, but now is unsure
- 22 about how to fit the concept into a plan of work. Council discussed Tree City outreach and the ability to
- 23 tie the stormwater issue into information materials during contact with communities that are
- 24 introduced to the TCUSA program. Requested that Ben Thompson re-send TCUSA material to members.
- 25 Lampman asked if members were comfortable with the materials developed by the program for their
- 26 use. Most members were not familiar with the materials. Thompson projected the presentation and
- 27 council members commented and suggested revisions to the slides. Ketchum projected a slide show that
- 28 she uses to promote the YAA. Council agreed that a photo-heavy presentation that 'grabs the heart' of
- 29 viewers is more effective than technical content. Staff will work to revise the presentation; requested
- 30 council members to send good photos of urban forests.
- 31 Council set a goal to independently secure one additional community into the TCUSA program. UCF staff
- 32 are available for support, and will send a revised list of those communities ready to become a TCUSA.
- 33 Scorcio asked that members be apprised of term expiration dates before the November meeting.
- Lampman will send an updated roster; the roster is also accessible on the council web page.
- Motion to adjourn: Garth Davis, Scorcio 2nd. Meeting adjourned 3:30 p.m.
