4510 feet of road construction and 41.4 acres of clear cut timber harvest. A number of Rule Identified Landforms are found throughout the project area. Most have been excluded from the timber harvest. Nearly every RIL has been excluded from the harvest area. However the proposed road construction does cross through one inner gorge.

An inner gorge on stream C is to be crossed, during the construction of road 261. The crossing itself will be a dipped, shot rock fill. Full bench construction will be utilized on the eastern approach to the crossing for approximately 145 feet. This full bench construction will be used to avoid sidecasting material on the steep side slopes.

Sufficient cross culverts will be installed to ensure that ditch water is removed and delivered to the forest floor prior to intersection with drainages. This will reduce any drainage pattern impacts to a minimum amount.


